EU-Project RURINNO: Short Introduction

RURINNO is an EU funded research and training project about **social entrepreneurship and social innovations in rural Europe**. We pay emphasis on cross-sectoral collaboration, mutual learning and knowledge-exchange. Our consortium comprises two outstanding research institutes (Leibniz Institute for Research on Society and Space, Erkner/Germany, Institute for Innovation Management, Johannes Kepler University Linz/Austria) and four highly experienced social enterprises operating in rural regions in Ireland, Poland, Austria and Greece. We share a strong interest in making rural regions an attractive place for living, working and visiting. We are convinced that social enterprises are an important type of actor, which promotes innovative solution to challenges occurring in rural regions today. Our project has **three goals**: First, it strives to **strengthen the innovative capacity of social enterprises** by cross-sectoral trainings, joint analyses of empirical findings and working on tangible products (book, practice toolkit). Second, RURINNO aims at **enhancing the political and public awareness of social entrepreneurship in rural regions** by informing about rural social entrepreneurship in public media, by organising a policy round table and publishing a policy brief. Thirdly, it strives to **improve the knowledge and the theoretical conceptualization** of how social entreprises foster social innovations and promote social change in rural regions.
